A national search is underway to recruit an experienced urban planning professional to serve as the next Director of the Toledo-Lucas County Plan Commission for the City of Toledo, Ohio. This is a great opportunity to advance your career by leading an exceptional staff through implementing the Forward Toledo comprehensive land use plan. You'll work alongside dedicated colleagues in a culture grounded in purpose, integrity, and respect where every voice matters, and every action serves.

The Toledo-Lucas County Plan Commission aligns its work with the City's strategic priorities to increase job creation and retention by supporting and catalyzing private sector investment, improving residential well-being, and enhancing neighborhood quality. The Director plays a crucial role in supporting the Lucas County Plan Commission, through a contract with the Board of Lucas County Commissioners, and the various township planning boards by providing professional planning expertise, technical assistance, and administrative guidance. This involves managing the staff assigned to monthly Lucas County Plan Commission meetings and cases, as well as offering advice on zoning ordinances, comprehensive plan updates, land use regulations, and development proposals. The Director helps ensure consistency and coordination in planning efforts across the county, facilitating communication and collaboration among different jurisdictional planning entities to promote cohesive and sustainable growth.

The Director of the Toledo-Lucas County Plan Commission reports directly to the City's Deputy Mayor and provides overall leadership and management of the Department. The Director will manage 19 full-time employees with a budget of approximately \$2.3 million.

Forward Toledo

The Forward Toledo plan was adopted in September 2024. This plan will guide land-use planning in Toledo for the next 10-20 years. It is our community's collective statement on who we want to be and how we would like to grow as a city. Forward Toledo is organized into five themes. Each theme focuses on key topics: Move, Place, Play, Build, and Sustain. Below is a brief summary of each theme and a link to more detail about the goals and strategies that were identified by a group of local professionals as a starting point for a broader conversation with the public about how land is developed and used.

- How should we Move? This theme focuses on the proposed goals and strategies for increasing connectivity, supporting public transit, and encouraging walkability. https://toledo.oh.gov/residents/forward/move

Comprehensive Review and Update of Zoning and Land-Use Policies

The Director will also be a part of the Toledo team that is implementing a comprehensive update of the Toledo Zoning Code and Development Standards. The Plan Commissions together will develop a scope of work and progress deliverables; select a nationally recognized zoning update consultant through a competitive Request for Proposal process; plan and implement stakeholder and citizens engagement; provide consultant oversight; and facilitate necessary approvals for any proposed update.

An update to the zoning code will benefit low to moderate income (LMI) households through reducing barriers to affordable housing construction across the entire city of Toledo, in which about 57% of the population is classified as LMI. A zoning update will address the following key Land Use and Entitlement Strategy Areas identified by Forward Toledo and Toledo Together: Expanding by-right zoning for higher-density development; Expanding by-right zoning for missing middle housing types; Developing by-right zoning for infill development; Increasing transparency and predictability for development decision making.

Other possible outcomes of the zoning rewrite which would reduce barriers to affordable housing production include:

- Developing or updating overlays to encourage development or simplifying or changing overlays that pose barriers to affordable housing development or preservation.
- Reducing or eliminating parking minimums, building height, minimum lot size, etc. that restrict new development.
- Streamlining or eliminating requirements where possible that delay the permitting process or establish unreasonable thresholds for approvals.
- Rezoning to allow multifamily or mixed-use development including housing in office, commercial, and light industrial zones.
- Developing proposals for policies that incentivize mixed-income development, such as the inclusion of affordable units in market rate properties.

Complementing these proposed changes would be ongoing community engagement and education conversations to explain changes to the code before, during, and after the zoning update process. Resistance to change has been a significant barrier for many larger residential projects in Toledo and the intent is to reduce resistance through

community education that underscores the need and the reason for these changes. The review and updates to the zoning code will begin Summer 2025 with completion by February 2028. Benefits will begin after adoption of the updated code and will continue long past the end of the performance period.

City of Toledo Governance and Values

The City is governed by the Mayor and City Council with the assistance of various departments, agencies, and commissions. Mayor Wade Kapszukiewicz was sworn in as the 58th Mayor of Toledo on January 2, 2018, and was elected for a second 4-year term in 2021. The legislative authority in the City is vested in a twelve-member Council. Six members of the Council are elected at-large and six from districts, all for four-year terms. The City has more than 2,700 employees and an annual budget of approximately \$1,014,831,681.

The City of Toledo is seeking an experienced and visionary Director of Planning to lead the Toledo-Lucas County Plan Commissions. This role will also be responsible for implementing the Forward Toledo plan as adopted in 2024.

The Director will supervise a skilled planning team, maintain and update the Master Plan, serve as the technical advisor to the Plan Commission, and collaborate closely with City leadership, Council, developers, and residents to shape the future of our city and region. This role combines strategic leadership, public engagement, technical expertise, and policy development.

A strong customer service ethic, a desire for long-term affiliation with the City of Toledo, and a highly professional approach to problem-solving are desired. The ideal candidate will also utilize continuous improvement methods and best practices, promote a cooperative team environment, and demonstrate integrity that aligns with organizational values.

- Strong knowledge of zoning, subdivision regulations, land use law, and urban design principles
- Proven leadership, communication, and strategic thinking skills
- Valid driver's license and acceptable driving record

Final Selection and Appointment

The Search Committee, made up of plan commission and economic development professionals, along with city officials, will make recommendations to the Mayor and Deputy Mayor and identify finalists for the position. Appointment to the position will be made by the Mayor based on a combination of education, experience, and credentials that best fit the needs of the City of Toledo and the Toledo-Lucas County Plan Commissions.
